

GENERAL SECRETARY'S REPORT

1963 saw the amalgamation of the two Central Districts into one with the following adjustments. Framlingham, Fressingfield, Cratfield, Laxfield, Mendham, Dennington, Weybread and Badingham have been transferred to the North East District. Ashbocking, Blaxhall, Easton, Monewden, Otley, Tunstall, Wickham Market and Hacheston are now in the South East District. It is to be hoped that this arrangement will now prove satisfactory.

The Guild approved the following subscription rates to operate from January 1st, 1964, together with the abolition of compound subscriptions. Resident and Hon. Members 5/- annually. Junior members under the age of 16, 2/6 annually. Non resident Life members, one payment of 10/-. The qualification of members with five years consecutive subscriptions to their credit to be able to become non resident life members without further payment should they remove from the Diocese to remain in force.

The Ladies Guild honoured us by holding their Annual General meeting at Ipswich during the year. This was the first time that it had been held within our territory.

The first Striking Competition to be held took place at Bredfield on August 31st, and proved to be a most successful afternoon. The winning band was led by Mr. Howard Egglestone of Henley and were presented with the Shield so kindly donated by Mr. Hubert Mitson. This is to be an annual event and it is to be hoped that the weather will always be as kind as it was at Bredfield.

Another new venture, which it is hoped that it will be possible to repeat, is a week-end course of instruction for would be instructors and conductors, to be held at Belstead House, Ipswich, January 21st to February 1st, 1964. This has been very kindly sponsored by The East Suffolk Education Committee.

The accounts show an excess in income over expenditure which is very gratifying after the trend of 1962. This is due very largely to reduced expenditure and shows that 1964 will prove that the increase in subscriptions which takes place then is necessary.

Further bell restoration has been carried out at Hartest and a grant was made to that parish from the Bell Fund.

The Central Council Meeting was held at Great Yarmouth when all four representatives attended.

In conclusion may I thank everyone who supported the Guild in any way during the year especially Mr. and Mrs. Frank Lufkin who so kindly judged the Striking Competition.

RINGING MASTER'S REPORT-1963

Once again a low peal year with only 55 to record, a decrease of one from 1962.

As our only 12 are not now pealable it is obvious no peals of Cinques or Maximus were rung. Anyway, there are four peals of Royal, but only one of Caters (Grandsire). 23 Peals of Major, included 13 of Surprise "Biddenden" rung in the county for the first time.

Our Grundisburgh friends finished the year with the one and only "Bob Triples". Again the Minor bands have topped the list with 25, several in seven or more methods. Two of Doubles completes the total.

These peals were rung in 38 towers and 29 shared the conducting, again headed by J. W. Blythe with eight, Ernest Steward calling his first and Miss R. Browne of Blaxhall ringing her first.

Peals of special mention are: St. Matthew's, Ipswich, "first" for 25 years.

The "Alan" peal at Lavenham, three of which reside in the county.

To Alan Munnings, congratulations, it is certainly unique an honour to ring a name peal for one's first.

Bob Major at Henley: Stanley Bloomfield, although he has been ringing for 30 years, has scored his first.

Not forgetting that stalwart of Leiston fame, Reg Kersey, who has made a come back after 30 years, is to continue, it is hoped.

Joe Roast and his band from over the border rang "London" at Lavenham, the only peal for the Guild in memory of President Kennedy.

First peal credit also goes to John Byatt (15) and William E. E. Pye (14). It is certainly great to see again that once familiar name in the peal columns and that it should be rung in a Suffolk tower.

Although quite a lot of bells are still silent in the county, maybe through lack of ringers or repair, it is most encouraging to know that 61 quarter peals, in 30 towers, were rung, most of these for some form of service.

Congratulations also go to our Rougham friends who rang 48 720's in 20 different methods. Good Going!

Credit goes to the Barking band who head the quarter peals with seven, while Elveden has five. How encouraging to see this once very quiet tower coming to the front.

The remains of the Framsden band have assisted in Service ringing in several places.

Ringing with a difference, for the first time took place in Ipswich during Christmas, when several young ringers played "Carols", etc., on the Town Hall steps in aid of S.M.L.T. bells. To Howard Egglestone, as instructor, G. R. Goodship and all who took part. Well Done.

TECHNICAL ADVISER'S REPORT

During 1963 your Technical Adviser reported on the bells in a Further 25 Suffolk towers bringing the total to date to 266, which is rather more than half the total of some 500 towers in the Diocese.

Of the 25 towers concerned 11 contained 4 or more bells, being those at Mendlesham (5), Dalham (5), Lavenham (8), Gazeley (6), Great Cornard (5), Little Cornard (5), Sapiston (4), Chevington (5), Worlington (5), Ipswich St. Mary at the Elms (5), and Mendham (6).

At Mendlesham it is hoped in due course to add a treble to make six and hang the new bell in the space provided in the frame when they were last rehung by Days of Eye in 1897.

At Dalham there is a very interesting pre-Reformation bell frame 16 ft. square in plan by 13 ft. 10 ins. tall, a veritable 'cage'. On my visit we rang the three tenors in full circles and the two trebles half up. There is some frame movement and the headstock on the third is in a poor state. With ropes the bells would be just about ringable but it is reported that they were rather hard work when last rung.

At Lavenham the existing frame is as old as the top of the tower, 1525. It is not in good condition due to extensive decay, and though some members are 17 ins. square in section the long term position is unsatisfactory. Consideration is now being given on what action to take.

Gazeley bells are now unringable. Most are very worn where the clappers strike, the fourth bell headstock is in a very bad condition and the N gudgeon on the fifth is loose on the stock.

Great Cornard were hung dead in 1947 when the treble was recast. Now the clock dial rod, installed in 1951, passes right through the centre of the elm deadstock supporting the tenor!

Little Cornard also has five bells and these too are quite unringable. In fact there were piles of sticks by three of the bells up to the crowns. The fourth is cracked, and the third probably so though the sticks made the exact location of the crack diffiult.

The four bells at Sapiston are sound but their fittings and frame are in a very poor state indeed. The pre-Reformation $8\frac{1}{2}$ cwt. tenor has never been turned and is worn to a depth of $\frac{1}{2}$ in. on one side, wear in excess of $\frac{1}{4}$ in. can be considered dangerous!

Chevington bells were last rung about 1930. They were rehung with new fittings in a new frame by Bullock of Ixworth in 1905 and a peal was rung on them in 1907. There is a dummy upper section to the tower, added about 1800, which has been causing trouble over the years.

Worlington tenor (8 cwt.) is a fine bell bearing the name of John Godynge of Kings Lynn who was working about 1310. In 1850 Taylors added a treble to make five and recast the present fourth. They were all hung with new fittings in a new frame at the same time. Now the timberwork is extremely badly wormeaten and decayed and the bells are quite unringable.

The five at St. Mary at the Elms, Ipswich, have had little done to them since 1800 and are now in a serious condition even for swing chiming, mainly due to weak securing straps, very worn soundbows, and a clapper which is too long. The anti-clockwise circle has the treble rope falling between second and third.

At Mendham the rope circle is exactly the same and only the tenor of the six is safe even to swing chime; the others suffer from a too long clapper, very loose in headstock, seriously worn in soundbow, and the fifth has a badly broken lip which has affected the tone.

The five at Tuddenham St. Mary, by Mildenhall, are chimed from a manual and are now quite past swinging in full circles. The diagonally mounted frame is in a bad state and the fittings are fragmentary.

At Blaxhall it is intended to rehang the six bells in a new lowside cast iron frame with entirely new fittings. The present frame distorts and the fittings are basically those of 1881.

At Exning it is hoped to put the organ in the lower stage of the tower and the new ringing chamber will be on the first floor to be reached by a new internal staircase.

At Stoke by Clare a heating system is to be added on the ground inside the tower by the nave wall. This will involve a slight rearrangement of the ground floor ringing chamber. The clock occupies the first floor and ringing will have to continue from the ground.

At Nayland the brick upper section of the tower put on in 1832 and replacing an earlier timber spire has been removed as the pinnacles were unsafe. A new timber spire is to be erected and the bells, which are now at the foundry, will be rehung in a new frame lower down the tower than formerly.

At nearby Wissington the tenor to three which has been in two pieces for many years has now been lowered to the ground.

At Hartest a new treble to make six was dedicated during the year, and an Ellacombe chiming system has been installed for the five at Groton which will be much safer than the clocking in use at the time of your Adviser's visit.

There were fragments in Coddenham ringing chamber of a chandelier presented by Theodore Eccleston in 1740. He was instrumental in getting the present Coddenham eight cast and Stonham Aspall made ten and was Master of the Ancient Society of College Youths in 1750. The chandelier has now been restored to its former state and it is to be hoped that in time the bells he gave to this church will be overhauled.

At Martlesham the cracked tenor to three has been recast and all have been rehung with new fittings for swing chiming.

Your adviser has now had a personal look at all the unringable rings of bells in the Diocese, and he has made detailed reports on the state of a good many of them. He is sure that if change ringing could be made to flourish in the area many of them would be overhauled but as it is the parishes do not feel like spending over £1,000 on a set of equipment which probably will not be fully used.
